Global Watershed Changes in the Constitution of Firms?

- From functionally integrated hierarchies to networked firms and open innovation systems
- Combining innovation and cost-reduction: Constantly redefinition of roles and rules among firms in global value chains
- Developing High Performance Work Organizations: Integrating planning and execution in teams; decentralizing external relations (can-ban-systems)
- New Managerial techniques: Continuous improvement, root-cause analysis, appreciative enquiry, simultaneous engineering, heuristic design.

Dramatic Reposition of NBS

- 1990s: US and UK domination through finalization troubled Germany and France picking up by liberal reforms
- 2000s: The Emergence of South East Asia, Latin America, China and India as realization of and challenge to global value chains.
- From 2005: The Surprising Performance of Small State Business Systems and a troubled Southern Europe
- Now: The Financial Crisis Quetioning Everything.

The Re-emergence of Europe as a set of Vibrant Economies.

- The Lisbon Scorecards:
 - 2002: Only Finland contest the US: The Finish Innovation System (NOKIA)
 - 2004: Finland, Denmark and Sweden outperform the US: Two Innovation Systems and Danish Flexicurity
 - 2006: Denmark, Finland, Sweden, Netherlands, Germany and UK outperforms the US
 - A number of Enigmas: Iceland conquering and loosing the world, Irish prosperity and bankrupcy, Italian stagnation
- WHY?

NBS having divergent ways of constructing "Projective Cities"?

- US, UK and France constructing mobile elites (centered around finance) and immobile, servicing masses: Dual Labour Markets?
- Germany, Belgium, Italy and others restoring the position of male breadwinners through Employment Protection Agreements?
- The Nordic Welfare States as a Question Mark: Can Projective cities be inclusive?
